INTRODUCTION

The Lalagi community predominantly farmers. They run a daily farming shift of 6 am-12noon and take a 2hrs break to return to farm by 2 pm till dusk. Farming is life to them and it can be concluded that everybody in that community has a farm. They take pride in the number of bags they get from the rice or beans plantation above every other thing as they believe nothing else affords them a better future than farming.

Education, to a larger part of this community is not a priority as the proceeds from their harvest can assure them a livelihood much better than many graduates which end up leaving school without a good job to show for it. Based on this believe they encourage their children to leave school for farm and they frown at any person wanting to force them to do otherwise. The children in this community can barely speak English and a larger percentage cannot as much as identify the alphabets not to talk of reading. This leads us to a major concern, which is, what happens to this community when the learned population fades out?


